### **Course Description:**

A presentation of the principles and laws of physics, biochemistry, and chemistry applicable to the field of anesthesia, an inclusive review of equipment, instrumentation, and technology needed for anesthesia management. There will be a thorough review of anesthesia delivery systems, airway equipment, and the multiple monitoring devices that may be utilized during anesthesia. Various types of radiological imaging will also be presented in this class.

### **Course Objectives:**


By the end of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1.0 Describe aqueous solutions and concentrations; acids, bases and salts; chemical reactions: oxidation, reduction, hydrolysis, and conjugation.
- 2.0 Identify Physics concepts including: Units of measurement, Gases and gas laws, Solubility, diffusion and osmosis, Pressure and fluid flow, Electricity and electrical safety, Vaporization and humidification and the Measurement of oxygen, carbon dioxide and hydrogen ions.
- 3.0 Describe anesthesia delivery systems including: High/low pressure gas sources, Regulators/manifolds, Flowmeters, valves, floats, Vaporizers, Proportioning systems, Pressure failure safety devices, Fail-safe devices, Ventilators, Carbon dioxide absorbent, Anesthetic circuits (Rebreathing, circle system, Non-rebreathing, and Modified non-rebreathing) and Pneumatic and electronic alarm devices.
- 4.0 Have an in-depth understanding of airway equipment including: Face masks, Laryngoscope (Rigid, Videoscope, and Optically enhanced scopes), Flexible fiberoptic bronchoscope, Endotracheal tubes, Endobronchial tube (including double

- lumen tube), Airways (Oral, Nasal), Supraglottic Airways (i.e., LMA), Intubating supraglottic airways, Jet ventilation, Intubating stylets, Lighted stylets, Cricothyrotomy (needle and surgical), and others (such as Eschmann catheter i.e., "bougie," Combitube, and Exchange catheters)
- 5.0 Describe the various monitoring equipment used in anesthesia management including: Evoked potential, Intracranial pressure, Modified EEG monitor (BIS, PSArray), Cerebral oximetry, Cardiovascular Electrocardiogram, Arterial pressure monitoring, Noninvasive blood pressure monitoring, Central venous pressure monitoring, Pulmonary artery pressure monitoring/SvO2, Cardiac output, Precordial/esophageal stethoscope/Doppler, Pulmonary/airway monitoring (Capnography, Airway gas analysis, Pulse oximetry, Airway pressure, Blood gas analysis, Peripheral nerve stimulator, Urinary output monitoring, Temperature monitoring, Maternal/fetal monitoring issues and Others (Fluid/blood warmers, Forced air warming blanket, Heat and moisture exchanger (HME), and Blood salvage (cell saver).
- 6.0 Identify Imaging techniques including Ultrasound, Fluoroscopy, and Radiography.

# Course Description:

This course is designed to apply the principles of biomedical and health care ethics toward a more informed understanding of realistic cases of ethical decision making in the healthcare environment for anesthesia providers. The course looks towards a systematic approach to ethical problems that arise in the clinical, research, and administrative settings, as well as the ethical responsibilities of all participants in each of these areas.

## Topics:

- The history of the biomedical ethics movement including research ethics
- Utilizing a case method approach of moral problem solving
- Respecting privacy and confidentiality
- Communication, truth-telling, and disclosure of information
- Determining a patient's capacity to share in decision making
- The process of informed consent
- Treatment refusals by patients and clinicians
- Organ transplantation
- Decisions about treatments for newborns, infants and children
- Reproductive issues
- The ethics of healthcare economics
- Ethics services in health care organizations, including organizational ethics

# Course Objectives:

At the completion of the course the student should demonstrate:

- The ability to identify the ethical problems of frequently faced cases in healthcare.
- The ability to understand the history of these obligations and problems and see them as opportunities to enhance patient and family care.

- The ability to use a case method approach in systematically assessing, goal directing, and resolving ethical problems or conflict.
- Understanding of an organizational ethics program and how to utilize and participate in these services to resolve ethical problems in healthcare.

#### Online Voicethread Discussion

Voicethread (VT) is a discussion tool that encourages discourse through audio and video commenting. It will serve as the platform for the weekly case critiques. It is expected that you comment in video format as part of the discussion. Text-based comments will only be accepted for references to supplement audio/video comments. The Voicethread critiques compose a majority of the online participation grade.

Each participant in each group will be assigned to complete a case analysis for that week using the 4-part method as described. The analysis will be submitted to both the assignment tab for grading and also to the group discussion board for each member to review. The case analysis is due by 0800am Thursday of each week to allow time for the critique and discussion of the case. The student submitting the case analysis for the week is not required to participate in the VT critique of the case. AMA format is required with citations and references.

Another student will be assigned to begin the discussion with their critique of the case analysis. To critique the case the student will add VT slides with 3-4 critique points for the class to discuss. The critique is due by Friday 0800am each week to allow time for discussion.

Following the critique each member of the group will engage in the voicethread discussion. Discussion will be open for participation until Midnight of the last date as scheduled for the case.

Failure to participate results in a score of "F" for the case.

#### Evaluation:

Grades will be determined in the following manner:

- Twenty percent (20%) for written cases analyses using the four part method described in the Fletcher text. The instructor expects that required readings will be integrated into case analyses and responses.
- Fifty percent (50%) for online participation of ethical cases presented by the instructor and analyses posted by peers. These cases will be directly related to the reading assignments for each online session.
- Thirty percent (30%) for a final group case analysis. The instructor will assign topic.

#### Grading:

A = Excellent (The student demonstrates a superior grasp of the subject matter.)

B = Above average (The student demonstrates a good understanding of the subject matter.)

C = Average (The student meets the minimum expectations for mastery of the subject matter.)

D = Below average (The student demonstrates a limited understanding of the subject matter.)

F = Failing (The student fails to comprehend the subject matter.)

## Grading Philosophy:

- Students will not be graded on their personal moral views. Nor will they be graded upon their agreement with the instructor's moral views. In health care ethics, as in the rest of life, good people can disagree on moral positions and standards on a variety of issues.
- Students will be evaluated upon their ability to clearly and logically express their views and positions. They will be evaluated upon their ability to examine and question their own closely held moral and ideological positions. They will also be evaluated on their ability to understand and appreciate viewpoints different from their own.
- Students will be evaluated on the quality and thoroughness of their written work (primarily in the form of case analyses) and upon their ability to incorporate required readings into the discussions.
- Students will be evaluated upon their participation in discussions. The quality of these discussions is more important than the frequency of participation, though the student should participate enough to be a valuable contributor to the ongoing dialogue.
- Students should also be both civil toward and respectful of others in the discussion forum. Discussions may at time be robust, vigorous, and challenging. However, they should not deteriorate to the level of personal attacks because of differing personal views and values.



Admission requirements

Completed application must be received by CSDCAS and noted as complete by January 15 to be considered

for the fall semester. The number of students who can enter the program each year is limited. Admission to the program is competitive.

There are two admission processes for the Doctor of Audiology program, depending upon if a student is admitted through the accelerated track, which begins in the senior year of the UG program or the traditional track, which begins after the UG degree has been awarded. Please be sure to follow the appropriate application process. If you are unsure which of the following two options to follow, please contact the CSD Department Head.

Applicants applying to the Doctor of Audiology program via the traditional track, after obtaining a Bachelor's degree, must submit a completed application via the CSDCAS application service by January 15. For instructions on the CSDCAS application process, please visit the CSDCAS website at https://csdcas.liaisoncas.com/applicant-ux/#/login. For those applicants that are selected and accept admission to the Doctor of Audiology program, data from the CSDCAS application can be sent to the Graduate College. Thus, it is not necessary to complete an application to the Graduate College.

Applicants applying to the Doctor of Audiology program via the accelerated track must submit a completed application to the MSU Graduate College by January 15th in the spring prior to the senior year to be considered for the fall semester. Applicants to the accelerated program are not required to submit an application via the CSDCAS website.

If accepted to the accelerated program, up to 12 hours of coursework may be counted to both the undergraduate and graduate degrees. Before enrolling in a course to be counted toward both undergraduate and graduate credit and to count the course toward the AuD degree, an undergraduate student must be accepted into the accelerated program and receive prior approval from the graduate advisor, Department Head of CSD, and the Dean of the Graduate College using a Mixed Credit Form. Acceptance into the program and all approvals must be completed prior to the end of the Change of Schedule Period for the semester. Admission to the program is competitive. Because the accelerated track is more rigorous than the traditional track, accelerated students must meet more stringent admission prerequisites, which include additional course work in the sciences. Students should contact the CSD Department Head for details regarding prerequisites.

Full admission to the accelerated program shall be based on the following components and application requirements/deadlines:

Students must complete at least 75 hours of coursework at the undergraduate level, including college algebra, chemistry, biology, and physics. Please contact the CSD Department Head to determine which science classes are acceptable.

Students must have a cumulative GPA of at least 3.25 (4.00 scale) on all coursework attempted, including transferred work.

Students must submit Graduate Record Examination (GRE) scores to the Graduate College.

Students must submit three letters of recommendation. At least two of the three must speak to the student's academic potential for graduate school (i.e., current/former instructors/professors).

Students must submit evidence of job shadowing experience. At least 25 hours of shadowing experience is

required prior to application to the accelerated program. An additional 25 hours of shadowing will be required prior to initiation of graduate coursework in the senior year.

Full admission to the program via the traditional track shall be based on the following components and application requirements/deadlines:

A Bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited university. While a degree in CSD is not necessary, undergraduate course work must include a biology course (or closely related, as determined by the department head), a physics or chemistry course, as well as a mathematics course.

Students must have a cumulative GPA of at least 3.00 (4.00 scale) on all coursework attempted, including transfer work.

Students must submit Graduate Record Examination (GRE scores). GRE scores must be submitted through CSDCAS by choosing the MSU designation (code 0741).

Students must submit three letters of recommendation. At least two of the three must speak to the student's academic potential for graduate school (i.e., current/former instructors/professors).

There is no change in overall credit hour requirements.

We are adding a 2 hour counseling class back into the curriculum. The class was offered in the past but taken out and content was distributed across the curriculum. As health care evolves, and the population ages, it is clear that we need a dedicated counseling class.

In addition, we have two courses (CSD 878 and 879) that are 2 hours each. These courses used to be one course (4 credits) and were split apart a year ago. We have found that the distribution of content needs to be different. So, we are reducing CSD 878 to from two hours to one hour, and increasing CSD 879 from 2 hours to 3 hours. The overall net is the same - 4 hours.

Finally, we are removing a dedicated 2 hour statistics course from our curriculum and integrating the material into our research design course.

All changes are based on faculty, student, and alumni feedback.

- 4. All coursework must be approved by the Program Director.
- 5. The candidates must pass oral and a written comprehensive examination.
- 6. No more than 5 hours of C grade is allowed during the program.
- 7. Candidates who do not achieve the academic standards set forth by the program will be immediately dismissed.
- 8. BS to DNAP candidates, during the clinical phase (years 2 and 3), will carry liability insurance purchased through the AANA.
- 9. For MS to DNAP candidates, a \$900 fee will be applied to each class. For BS to DNAP candidates, a \$3,500 program fee will be applied to each semester (Summer, Fall and Spring).

The Master of Science in Nutrition and Dietetics (MSND) program provides knowledge and skills in the dietetics field with an emphasis on population health. This program will prepare dietetic professionals to work at various settings: community and government agencies, medical care facilities, and educational institutions. Graduates specialize in nutrition and dietetics of various population health issues, are able to assess population health needs, and design, implement and evaluate programs, systems or environments to aid in improving the health of diverse groups of population.

#### Admission requirements

To be considered for admission to the Master of Science in Nutrition and Dietetics (MSND), a prospective student must be admitted to Missouri State's Dietetic Internship Graduate Certificate Program (DI) or provide a copy of their Registered Dietitian and Nutritionist (RDN) identification card issued by the Commission on Dietetic Registration.

Final admission decisions will be based on a complete application form to the Graduate College. There is a graduate program application fee per the MSU Graduate College policy. A complete application includes the following:

- 1.Evidence of meeting the minimum academic requirements from an ACENDapproved Didactic Program in Dietetics by a "Verification Statement" or "Declaration of Intent to Complete Degree" and/or ACEND-approved "Minimum Academic Requirements."

#### **Program description**

The undergraduate Social Work Program at Missouri State University builds upon a liberal arts education while preparing students for the practice of Social Work, with an emphasis on the strengths perspective. Social Work is a comprehensive major consisting of 48 hours of required Social Work courses (which includes a 12-hour practicum); 18 hours of required courses from the humanities and sciences; and 6 hours of electives offered by the School of Social Work (SWK electives). Students who successfully complete general education, all general baccalaureate requirements and major requirements are awarded a Bachelor of Social Work degree.

Prospective students must contact the Coordinator of the BSW Program to obtain information on how to be admitted into the program and be assigned an advisor. Accepted students are expected to consult with their advisor at least once a semester.

This program is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education. Additional information regarding the BSW Program may be found in the *BSW Student Handbook* available from the School of Social Work.

#### Eligibility to apply

Once accepted to MSU, students are eligible to apply for admission into the BSW Program when the following conditions are met:

- A. Completion of a minimum of 45 hours with a combined GPA (Missouri State and transfer combined) of 2.50 or higher on a 4-point scale
- B. Completion or concurrent enrollment in the Foundations Courses for General Education except the second writing course
- C. Completion or concurrent enrollment in SWK 200(3), SWK 213(3), and SWK 219(3) with a minimum grade of "C". Candidates whose application is reviewed positively will not have admission to the Program until grades of "C" or better are recorded for these courses at the close of the application semester.

#### **Admission to the Bachelor of Social Work Program**

Students seeking admission to the BSW Program do so with the understanding that: (a) admission is competitive and selective and not all who apply can be accommodated; and (b) meeting the minimum standards does not guarantee a student will be admitted. The BSW committee will make a decision to admit based on a holistic picture of the completed course work and values that are consistent with the conduct of the profession and the Social Work Code of Ethics.

Students who are planning to pursue a BSW degree must complete the following steps:

1. Declare a major in the Social Work Program within the University which places the student in pre-admit status.

- 2. When a student is eligible to apply for admitted status, the student must submit a formal application, with accompanying forms, to the School of Social Work office. Directions for completing the packets will be included within the application packet. Applications for admission to the Program will be available online. Refer to the application packet for specific due dates because the dates can vary. Applications submitted after the deadline will not be considered. Incomplete applications may result in not being considered.
- 3. Students will be notified, prior to registration, if they are admitted into the BSW Program. If the student is not admitted, the student will be responsible for meeting with his/her advisor to transition into another major.

#### Retention, progression, and graduation policies

After admission into the BSW Program, students must achieve the following for retention in the major.

- 1. Maintain a combined GPA (Missouri State and transfer combined) of 2.50 or higher. If a student drops below a GPA of 2.50, the student will be withdrawn from the program at the end of the semester.
- 2. Achieve a grade of "C" or better in all Social Work courses, which are courses with "SWK" prefix.
- 3. Earning a "D" grade or below in a Social Work (SWK) course will result in the inability to be admitted into the program. If a student is formally accepted in the program and earns a "D" grade in a Social Work (SWK) course, the student must retake the course before progressing. If a student is formally accepted in the program and earns an "F" grade in a Social Work (SWK) course, s/he will be dismissed from the program at the end of the semester and will need to reapply.
- 4. Courses in the Social Work major may not be taken more than twice.

#### **BSW PROGRAM'S ATTENDANCE POLICY:**

Because class attendance and course grades are demonstrably and positively related, the University expects students to attend ALL class sessions of courses in which they are enrolled.

MSU's School of Social Work is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE). One of the core competencies that BSW programs must address is to help students "demonstrate professional demeanor in behavior" (CSWE, 2015). The first step in developing this is teaching students what professional demeanor looks like. In the classroom setting, students will be expected to show professionalism by: arriving on time, being courteous and respectful in all communication, and respectful of peers and the professor.

Additionally, this course serves as a key course in the social work program. It is designed to help in your preparation in becoming a competent generalist practitioner. Because of the nature of the social work curriculum, if you do not attend class, you will not be prepared with all the tools necessary to enter your future profession.

The attendance policy for the BSW program is based on the following concepts: (1) students rely on each other to engage in group activities; (2) the courses are interactive in nature and the participation of every student is essential; (3) instructors must hear from every student to ensure students are mastering course content; (4) assignments will be based on material addressed in class; (5) students must be able to take risks to share ideas, ask questions and practice skills; a safe environment in which to do this is created when class members are regularly in attendance, which develops trust in each other; (6) each subsequent class builds on the previous ones – the course material is sequential in nature. In addition, the material you learn in each class is essential for success in other social work classes and in practice.

If you are unable to attend class, the BSW program expects that you will contact the course instructor via email **BEFORE** class indicating the reason(s) why you are unable to attend class and your proposed plan for getting the information you missed in class due to your absence. Non-attendance for reasons unrelated to your participation in a University-sanctioned activity, a personal medical illness (a doctor's note is required) or a family emergency (e.g. death or serious illness of a family member accompanied by official documentation) will not be excused without a compelling reason that is discussed with the instructor. In other words, for an absence to be excused for one of the reasons listed above, the instructor must have official documentation (e.g., from a doctor). If you, or a family member is ill, the instructor must have documentation that indicates you had to miss class due to that illness. There are no excused absences for things such as having to work.

#### LATE ASSIGNMENT POLICY:

All assignments are due *at the beginning of class* on their respective due dates. Assignments submitted on the deadline date, but not at the beginning of class, will be automatically penalized 5%. Assignments submitted the next day (after the deadline date) will be automatically penalized 20%. Assignments submitted the following day will automatically be penalized 35%. Assignments submitted later than 48 hours will not be accepted for points.

For example, an assignment is due Tuesday at 9:30 AM. If the assignment is submitted Tuesday at 9:45 AM, it will be automatically penalized 5%. If the assignment is submitted Wednesday at

9:30 AM, it will be automatically penalized 20%. If the assignment is submitted Thursday at 9:30 AM it will automatically be penalized 35%. No assignments will be accepted for points after 48 hours from the due date.

The instructor will provide detailed assignment instructions for each assignment. The instructor reserves the right to revise and amend assignments as the course unfolds to reflect any changes in lecture content, timelines, and topics relevant to students' particular interests. In the event of any such changes, the instructor will notify students in class or in writing and/or via e-mail. All papers will be prepared in accordance with APA style.

#### **MAKE-UP POLICY:**

Each student will be required to participate in a mock interview with School of Social Work faculty to help develop professional interviewing skills. #### **Critical Analysis of Self Assignment (Points Possible)**

This assignment is a self-assessment to help identify your current personal development and journey towards professional readiness. Through the use of various inventory tools conducted in class, you will gain self-awareness of the 7 domains of self (physical, emotional [including personality], mental health, social, spiritual, culturally, socioeconomic). You will write an analysis of self with the information you collect using the various inventories. The analysis should outline your strengths, areas of needed growth, and establish measureable goals for personal improvement. You will identify one area in your analysis that an ethical dilemma could possibly occur and demonstrate understanding of responding in an ethical manner. A detailed

rubric will be provided in class. The analysis will need to be 8-10 pages, APA format. Please see course schedule for due dates. Additionally, you will present your findings in an 8-10 minute presentation to the class on the date assigned by your instructor.

#### Wellness Portfolio Assignment (Points Possible)

You will be required to organize the various inventories/class activities into a portfolio organized by the 7 domains of self. This process can assist you in the Critical Analysis of Self as well. A detailed rubric will be provided in class. See course schedule for due date.

### **Key Assignment Professional Resume and Interview Assignment**

This key assignment will measure:

### Competency 1: Demonstrating Ethical and Professional Behavior Knowledge and Values:

- Recognize personal values and the distinction between personal and professional values.
- Understand how personal experiences and affective reactions influence professional judgement and behavior.
- Understand the profession's history, its mission, and the roles and responsibilities of the profession.
- Understand the role of other professions when engaged in inter-professional teams.
- Recognize the importance of life-long learning and committed to continually updating skills to ensure relevancy and effectiveness.
- Understanding emerging forms of technology and the ethical use of technology in social work practice.

#### **Skills:**

- Use reflection and self-regulation to manage personal values and maintain professionalism in practice situations.
- Demonstrate professional demeanor in behavior; appearance; and oral, written, and electronic communication.
- Use technology ethically and appropriately to facilitate practice outcomes.

#### **Overview:**

The purpose of this assignment is to prepare you to assess your own capabilities in preparation for seeking professional employment. To do this, you will be required to complete a professional cover letter, resume, and mock interview. Below are the instructions for each step.

#### **Cover Letter and Resume Instructions:**

You will be required to write a cover letter for an agency that you are considering interviewing for during your practicum semester. If you are unsure of an agency, please just choose a population that you might be interested in. Your cover letter should be no more than one page in length. It should include the following information (Competency 1 Measure Knowledge/Value/Skills/Cognitive and Affective Processes):

- Introduce yourself
- Mention the job (or kind of job) your applying for
- Match your skills and experiences with the skills and experiences required for the job
- A summary of why you feel you are perfect for the job
- Ask them to read your resume and provide them with your contact information

In addition to a cover letter, you will be required to turn in a one page resume. This resume should include the following things (Competency 1 Measure Knowledge/Value/Skills/Cognitive and Affective Processes):

- Your name and contact information
- Your education (don't include high school)
- Your work experience
- Extracurricular activities, if any (this could include volunteer experience, etc.)
- Three professional references with their contact information

After you have completed your resume and cover letter you are required to complete the following steps:

- 1. Make an appointment with the Career Center to review your updated resume. Please have he/she sign or stamp your resume for verification purposes.
- 2. After the appointment, make recommended edits
- 3. Turn in original and edited copies of resume

#### **Mock Professional Interview Instructions:**

Each student will be required to participate in a mock interview with School of Social Work faculty to help develop professional interviewing skills. On the day of the interview, students will be required to arrive on time, wear professional attire, and bring a copy of their resume and cover letter. The students will pretend that they are interviewing for the agency that they chose on their cover letter when answering questions. The interview will last approximately 15 minutes. Students will be graded on their attire and verbal and nonverbal communication skills (Competency 1 Measure Knowledge/Value/Skills/Cognitive and Affective Processes).
